ANALYSIS

COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND TRANSPORTATION:

The subject property is currently vacant. Thus, while any development at this site would be serviced by City utilities and sanitation, there is no established utility and sanitation service at this site. The site falls under the jurisdiction of public safety services. No significant impact is expected on community facilities or services as a result of this request.

ENVIRONMENTAL:

The subject property does not contain wetlands and is not located in a special flood hazard area. There is no expected environmental impact associated with this request.

ZONING CONSIDERATIONS:

Whether or not to grant a zoning map amendment from the R3 (Medium Density Multi-Family Residential) zoning district to the CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district

The request should be considered in light of:

- the standards for determination of zoning map amendments given in Section 2007 of the Statesboro Zoning Ordinance
- the vision and community policies articulated within the Statesboro Comprehensive Plan
- the 2035 Bulloch County/City of Statesboro Long Range Transportation Plan
- the potential for the property to develop and be utilized in conformance with the requirements of the proposed R4 (High Density Residential District) zoning district as set forth in the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*.

R-3: The R3 zoning district is a residential district accommodating single family residences as well as twin homes/duplexes.	CR: The commercial retail district can accommodate a wide variety of uses, including retail stores, professional offices, restaurants, churches, as well as residential uses.

The applicant has provided a sketch plan showing a 4000 sq ft building, with two suites of equal size. The intended tenant(s) are not stated.

Given the lack of detail regarding the proposed use, staff is unable to recommend this zoning map amendment. The commercial retail allows for a wide variety of uses, some of which are incompatible with the character of the area, as per the *Statesboro Comprehensive Master Plan*.

STANDARDS: ZONING MAP AMENDMENT

Section 2007 of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* provides **eight (8) standards** for the Mayor and City Council to consider "in making its determination" regarding a zoning map amendment, in "balancing the promotions of the public health, safety, morality (morals), and general welfare against the right of unrestricted use of property." Those standards are as follows:

- (1) Existing uses and zoning or (of) property nearby;
 - a. Existing uses and zoning of property nearby varies. Property to the north is currently zoned EXPT (Exempt) and is home to the Georgia Southern University Botanical Gardens. Property to the south is zoned R3 (Medium Density Multiple Family Residential) and is occupied by a residential structure. Property to the west is also zoned R3 and consists of another residential structure on one lot as well as two other lots owned by the Botanical Gardens. To the east, the property fronts Fair Road, and the properties on the other side of Fair Road are zoned R20 (Single Family Residential) and are occupied by detached single family dwellings.
- (2) The extent to which property values are diminished by the particular zoning restrictions.
 - a. The subject site is currently zoned R3 (Medium Density Multiple Family Residential). Per Article VI, Sections 603(A), 603(B), and 603(C), this parcel can current be developed for a single family structure or one duplex or twin dwelling. Home occupations can operate from such dwellings pursuant to Section 601(F). Under the proposed CR (Commercial Retail) zoning, multiple business types are permitted. There is no other property zoned CR in the surrounding parcels

Note: Please note that staff has not consulted a professional appraiser regarding the impact of the requested zoning map amendment on the property value. Therefore, any discussion pertaining to specific property values should be considered speculative.

- (3) The extent to which the description of property values of the property owner promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public.
- (4) The relative gain to the public, as compared to the hardship imposed upon the property owner.
- (5) The suitability of the subject property for the zoned purposes.
- (6) The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned, considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property.
 - a. Staff is unaware of previous uses or development on this property. The current zoning is consistent with the zoning and uses of surrounding parcels. There is existing property with Commercial Retail zoning on the west side of the neighborhood that lies immediately west of the subject site.
- (7) The extent the proposed change would impact the following: population density in the area; community facilities; living conditions in the area; traffic patterns and congestion; environmental aspects; existing and future land use patterns; property values in adjacent areas; and
- (8) Consistency with other governmental land use, transportation, and development plans for the community.

STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends disapproval of the application. The proposed uses cannot be determined to be compatible with the surrounding zoning and uses, which consists of primarily of residential properties.

PLANNING COMMISSION RECOMMENDATION:

At the regularly scheduled meeting held June 5, 2018 at 5:00 PM, the Planning Commission vote 5-0 to <u>disapprove</u> the zoning map amendment requested by application RZ 18-05-05.



EXHIBIT C: CITY OF STATESBORO 2014 FUTURE DEVELOPMENT MAP





PROPOSAL:

The applicant requests a variance from <u>Article XV Section 1509(C) Table 4</u> of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* regarding the maximum allowed total square feet of signage in Sign District 2. (See **Exhibit A** – Location Map.

Specifically, the applicant's goal is to install one(1) additional building sign on the front elevation, at a size of 66.59 sq ft; existing signage on the front elevation currently totals 120.63 sq ft. The total allowed square footage for building signs is 125 sq ft; the proposed sign would bring the total to 187.22 sq ft (150% of the allowed amount).

BACKGROUND:

The applicant recently undertook renovations to accommodate an online grocercy ordering pick-up service at this location. The proposed sign relates to that service.

In addition, the Future Development Map and Defining Narrative section of the Comprehensive Plan states the following:

"Statesboro residents have expressed dissatisfaction with a variety of features in the community which clutter streetscapes and obstruct natural landscape features -particularly on major corridors entering and exiting the community. While City leadership has acknowledged the need to comprehensively update land development regulations to holistically address aesthetic concerns, there exist a number of individual topics which can be addressed by ordinance amendments in the short-term. Signs (attached and detached) should be managed by incorporating uniform design features, and by restricting billboards and other off-premise signage which distract from traffic control signage and compete with local and other on-site businesses."

ANALYSIS

I. Variance from Article XV Section 1509(C) Table 4: Sign District 2 Dimension standards to allow for installation of one(1) additional building sign on the front elevation.

The applicant is requesting a variance from Article XV (Signs) regarding the maximum allowed square footage for building signs. Article XV (Signs) Section 1509 of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* regulates the dimensional standards for all building signs within the City of Statesboro. The subject site is located in the CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district and is regulated by the dimensional standards of Sign District 2

The ordinance states that the maximum square footage for building signs for an individual establishment on an individual lot is 125 sq ft. (See **Exhibit D**—Section 1509(C) Table 4). The applicant has installed 120.63 sq ft of signage on the front elevation as of this application, and is proposing 66.59 of additional square footage, bringing the total proposed to 187.22 sq ft (See **Exhibit E**—Proposed Signage Plans).

ANALYSIS (Cont'd)

Section 1503(G) states that no variances shall be permitted from the terms of Article XV regarding signs in the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*. It continues to state that "Specifically, no variances under article XVIII of this ordinance [chapter] shall be applicable to the standards contained within this article." However, Article XV regarding signs is part of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*, which provides for the award of variances by the City Council from the zoning regulations stating that "approval of a variance must be in the public interest, the spirit of the ordinance must be observed, public safety and welfare secured, and substantial justice done" and **Section 1801 states that the Mayor and Council [should] consider if the following are true in its consideration of a variance request:**

- 1. There are special conditions pertaining to the land or structure in question because of its size, shape, topography, or other physical characteristic and that condition is not common to other land or buildings in the general vicinity or in the same zoning district;
- 2. The special conditions and circumstances do not result from the actions of the applicant;
- 3. The application of the ordinance to this particular piece of property would create an unnecessary hardship; and
- 4. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of the zoning regulations.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of this variance.

At the regularly scheduled meeting held on June 5, 2018, at 5:00 PM, the Planning Commission voted 5-0 to recommend approval of the variance requested by application V 18-05-01.




PROPOSAL:

The applicant requests a variance from <u>Article XV Section 1509(C) Table 3</u> of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* regarding the maximum allowed total square feet of building signs in Sign District 1. (See **Exhibit A –** Location Map.)

Specifically, the applicant's goal is to install one (1) building signs on the side elevation at a size of 142.5 sq ft; the total allowed square footage for building signs is 40 sq ft; at a total of 142.5, this exceeds the maximum by 102.5 sq ft (256%).

BACKGROUND:

Currently, the site is zoned R-15 (Single Family Residential) and home the GSU's Wesley Foundation ministry. The applicant is proposing to install a building sign on the side elevation of the structure facing Fair Road (See **Exhibit E**- Proposed Signage Plans). The amount allowed by ordinance is 40 square feet in total; the proposed sign is 142.5 sq ft.

ANALYSIS

1. Variance from Article XV Section 1509(C) Table 3: Sign District 1 Dimension standards to allow for installation of a building sign on side elevation.

The applicant is requesting a variance from Article XV (Signs) regarding the maximum allowed square footage for building signs. Article XV (Signs). Section 1509 of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* regulates the dimensional standards for all building signs within the City of Statesboro. The subject site is located in the R-15 (Single Family Residential) zoning district and is regulated by the dimensional standards of Sign District 1. The ordinance states that the maximum square footage for building signs shall be 40 sq ft. (See **Exhibit D**—Section 1509(C) Table 3).

The proposed sign, at 142.5 sq ft, exceeds the allowed square footage by 102.5 sq ft, or 256%. (See **Exhibit E**—Proposed Signage Plans).

ANALYSIS (Cont'd)

Section 1503(G) states that no variances shall be permitted from the terms of Article XV regarding signs in the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*. It continues to state that "Specifically, no variances under article XVIII of this ordinance [chapter] shall be applicable to the standards contained within this article." However, Article XV regarding signs is part of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*, which provides for the award of variances by the City Council from the zoning regulations stating that "approval of a variance must be in the public interest, the spirit of the ordinance must be observed, public safety and welfare secured, and substantial justice done" and **Section 1801 states that the Mayor and Council [should] consider if the following are true in its consideration of a variance request:**

- 1. There are special conditions pertaining to the land or structure in question because of its size, shape, topography, or other physical characteristic and that condition is not common to other land or buildings in the general vicinity or in the same zoning district;
- 2. The special conditions and circumstances do not result from the actions of the applicant;
- 3. The application of the ordinance to this particular piece of property would create an unnecessary hardship; and
- 4. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of the zoning regulations.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of this variance

At the regularly scheduled meeting held on June 5, 2018, at 5:00 PM, the Planning Commission voted 5-0 to table application V 18-05-02 for further discussion and does not have a recommendation regarding V 18-05-02 at this time.





The subject site is located in the CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district and is regulated by the dimensional standards of Sign District 2 The ordinance states that the maximum square footage for building signs shall be the greater of 60 sq ft or 5% of the wall area allotted to that tenant; in this case, the latter applies, allowing for 69.75 sq ft (See Exhibit D—Section 1509(C) Table 4).

The applicant has installed one (1) b uilding sign on the front elevation, at a size of 45.4 sq ft, and the intention of this request is to allow for the installation of the same sign on the side and rear of the structure as well. 



PROPOSAL:

The applicant requests a variance from Article XV Section 1509(C) Table 5 of the Statesboro Zoning Ordinance regarding the maximum number of building signs allowed in Sign District 3. (See Exhibit A – Location Map. Specifically, the applicant's goal is to install eight (8) additional building signs on the front elevations.

BACKGROUND:

Currently, the site is undergoing construction of a new True Value hardware store. The applicant was approved for one 69.48 sq. ft. building sign on the front elevation on April 27, 2018 (See **Exhibit E—**Permit 3138). The applicant is proposing to install eight (8) additional department signs (e.g. "Paint," "Tools," etc.) to the front elevation as well. The size would not exceed the allowed square footage, but per Table 5, only one building sign per elevation is permitted.

In addition, the Future Development Map and Defining Narrative section of the Comprehensive Plan states the following:

"Statesboro residents have expressed dissatisfaction with a variety of features in the community which clutter streetscapes and obstruct natural landscape features -particularly on major corridors entering and exiting the community. While City leadership has acknowledged the need to comprehensively update land development regulations to holistically address aesthetic concerns, there exist a number of individual topics which can be addressed by ordinance amendments in the short-term. Signs (attached and detached) should be managed by incorporating uniform design features, and by restricting billboards and other off-premise signage which distract from traffic control signage and compete with local and other on-site businesses."

Statesboro Comprehensive Master Plan, Community Agenda page 11.

ANALYSIS

 Variance from Article XV Section 1509(C) Table 5: Sign District 3 Dimension standards to allow for installation of eight additional building signs the front elevations.

The applicant is requesting a variance from Article XV (Signs) regarding the maximum number of building signs allowed in Sign District 3. Article XV (Signs) Section 1509 of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* regulates the dimensional standards for all building signs within the City of Statesboro. The subject site is located in the CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district and is regulated by the dimensional standards of Sign District 3. The ordinance states that one building signs is permitted per elevation (See **Exhibit D**—Section 1509(C) Table 5).

The applicant has installed one (1) building sign on the front elevation, at a size of 69.48 sq ft, and the intention of this request is to allow for the installation of eight smaller signs with details about various departments located within the facility. This does not exceed the maximum square footage allowed for this establishment, but would bring the **total number of building signs** to **9**, which is an **additional 8 signs** over the maximum allowed (See **Exhibit F**—Proposed Signage Plans).

ANALYSIS (Cont'd)

Section 1503(G) states that no variances shall be permitted from the terms of Article XV regarding signs in the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*. It continues to state that "Specifically, no variances under article XVIII of this ordinance [chapter] shall be applicable to the standards contained within this article." However, Article XV regarding signs is part of the *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance*, which provides for the award of variances by the City Council from the zoning regulations stating that "approval of a variance must be in the public interest, the spirit of the ordinance must be observed, public safety and welfare secured, and substantial justice done" and **Section 1801 states that the Mayor and Council [should] consider if the following are true in its consideration of a variance request:**

- There are special conditions pertaining to the land or structure in question because of its size, shape, topography, or other physical characteristic and that condition is not common to other land or buildings in the general vicinity or in the same zoning district;
- 2. The special conditions and circumstances do not result from the actions of the applicant;
- 3. The application of the ordinance to this particular piece of property would create an unnecessary hardship; and
- 4. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of the zoning regulations.

RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends approval of this variance.

At the regularly scheduled meeting held on June 5, 2018, at 5:00 PM, the Planning Commission voted 5-0 to recommend approval of the variance requested by application V 18-05-04.





The Department of Planning & Development has reviewed the alcoholic beverage application submitted by Kaleo Lyles as agent of Live in the Boro LLC for 1830 Chandler Road (Tax Parcel MS62000009 000). The applicant is proposing the sale of beer and liquor at the location. The proposed sale of alcohol is permitted at the location and the application may be approved. Staffs recommendation is based on the following:

- 1) Zoning District: 1830 Chandler Road is located in the S/CR (Variance from R4 Commercial Retail) zoning district. Sale of beverages is permitted in this district.
- 2) General Regulations Pertaining to all Licenses: Per Chapter 6 Section 6-7(c)(2) of the Statesboro Code of Ordinances, Class E and D alcoholic beverage licenses may be issued in the CR (Commercial Retail Overlay) zoning district.
- 3) Alcoholic Beverages Proximity Restrictions: The Department of Planning & Development has reviewed the subject property for consistency with the proximity restrictions of Chapter 6 Section 6-7(d) of the Statesboro Code of Ordinances. The proposed location is required to adhere to the regulations set forth by O.C.G.A. § 3-3-21. As per Chapter 6(e)1, Class D, Class E and Class F alcoholic beverage licenses shall not be issued for a location without a certificate from a land surveyor, registered in the State of Georgia, showing a scaled drawing of the location of the proposed premises and the shortest straight line distance from the front door/primary entrance to any church building, school building, educational building, school grounds, college building, or college campus located within a radius of 100 yards of the premises.

Department of Planning and Development approval is based on the information provided within the alcoholic beverage application submitted for our review. Documents submitted by Donald W Marsh & Associates verify necessary proximity adherance.

The Department of Planning & Development encourages all applicants to access the Statesboro Zoning Ordinance online at http://www.statesboroga.gov/. As per Chapter 6(d)1, Class D, E and F licenses shall be issued for a location only if the location complies with the proximity requirements provided by O.C.G.A. § 3-3-21 as measured by the rules and regulations promulgated by the Georgia Department of Revenue. The attached survey verifies the conformity with proximity regulations as defined by O.C.G.A. § 3-3-21.

Department of Planning and Development approval is based on the information provided within the alcoholic beverage application submitted for our review. Documentation submitted by Maxwell Reddick & Associates verifies necessary proximity adherence.

RESOLUTION 2018-19: A RESOLUTION EXEMPTING CERTAIN VEHICLES FROM MARKING REQUIREMENTS FOR ONE YEAR

THAT WHEREAS, OCGA 36-80-20 requires that all publicly owned vehicles except those in law enforcement or vehicles owned by individuals that are paid with City funds must have a decal on the front side panels; and

WHEREAS, OCGA 36-80-20 allows the City Council to exempt vehicles from these provisions following a public hearing; and

WHEREAS, some employees receive car allowances in lieu of a City vehicle, and desire that these vehicles continue to be exempt from the requirements to have decals; and

WHEREAS, the 2001 Session of the General Assembly amended OCGA 36-80-20 to limit the duration of such an exemption to one year, requiring an annual exemption instead of doing it one time as under the previous statue; and

WHEREAS, the required Public Hearing on this matter was held on June 19, 2018;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Statesboro, Georgia as follows:

Section 1. That the following employees' vehicles paid for from car allowances provided as part of their compensation are hereby exempted for a period of one year from the requirement to have decals on the side panels, as authorized by OCGA 36-80-20:

City Manager Deputy City Manager Director of Public Utilities

Section 3. That this Resolution shall be and remain effective from and after its date of adoption

RESOLUTION 2018-20:A RESOLUTION TO ADOPT THE FISCAL YEAR 2019 BUDGET FOR EACH FUND OF THE CITY OF STATESBORO, GEORGIA, APPROPRIATING THE AMOUNTS SHOWN IN EACH BUDGET AS EXPENDITURES/EXPENSES, ADOPTING SEVERAL ITEMS OF REVENUE ANTICIPATIONS, AND PROHIBITING EXPENDITURES OR EXPENSES FROM EXCEEDING THE ACTUAL FUNDING AVAILABLE FOR APPROPRIATION

WHEREAS, sound governmental operations require a budget in order to plan the financing of services for the residents of the City of Statesboro; and

WHEREAS, Title 36, Chapter 81, Article 1 of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated (OCGA) requires a balanced budget for the City's fiscal year, which runs from July 1st to June 30th of each year; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council have reviewed the proposed FY 2019 Budget as presented by the City Manager and Director of Finance; and

WHEREAS, each of these funds is a balanced budget, so that anticipated revenues and other financial resources for each fund equal the proposed expenditures or expenses; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council wish to adopt this proposal as the Fiscal Year 2019 Annual Budget;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Statesboro, Georgia as follows:

Section 1. The proposed Fiscal Year 2019 budget, attached hereto and incorporated herein as a part of this Resolution, is hereby adopted as the budget for the City of Statesboro, Georgia for Fiscal Year 2019, which begins July 1, 2018 and ends June 30, 2019.

Section 2. The several items of revenues, other financial resources, and sources of cash shown in the budget for each fund in the amounts shown anticipated are hereby adopted, and that the several amounts shown in the budget for each fund as proposed expenditures or expenses, and uses of cash are hereby appropriated to the departments named in each fund.

Section 3. The "legal level of control" as defined in OCGA 36-81-2 is set at the departmental level, meaning that the City Manager in his capacity as Budget Officer is authorized to move appropriations from one line item to another within a department, but under no circumstances may expenditures or expenses exceed the amount appropriated for a department without a further budget amendment approved by the Mayor and City Council.

Section 4. All appropriations shall lapse at the end of the fiscal year.

Section 5. The Authorized Personnel by department and division shown in this budget are hereby formally adopted as the number of authorized positions within each department and division, until and unless amended by resolution of the Mayor and City Council.

Section 6. The Proposed Pay Plan for FY 2019 shown in this budget, as amended, is hereby formally adopted as the City's Pay Plan effective on July 1, 2018, unless further amended by resolution of the Mayor and City Council.

Section 7. The proposed Capital Improvements Program presented is hereby adopted as the City of Statesboro's Capital Improvements Program for FY 2019-FY 2024. This Program is hereby adopted as the City's long-term financial plan unless further amended by resolution of the Mayor and City Council.

Section 8. This Resolution shall be and remain in full force and effect from and after its date of adoption.

RE: Policy Issue: General Liability/Workers Comp. Insurance Carrier Recommendation

Recommendation:

After careful evaluation of all alternatives presented and considering the advice of our selected insurance broker Glenn Davis and Associates, we recommend both insurance policies (general liability and workers compensation) be awarded to Travelers insurance for the term of 1 year to begin August 1, 2018.

Background:

Previously, the City of Statesboro issued a request for qualifications to select a broker for our general liability and workers compensation insurance coverages. The general liability insurance includes numerous coverage areas such as, property, public officials, automobiles, law enforcement and several other areas are included as well. The workers compensation insurance stands alone as a separate policy. Our selected broker, Glenn Davis and Associates, then was tasked with shopping the markets for these two coverage areas and supplying the City with the best offers from insurance carriers for our consideration. With this being said, Glenn Davis and Associates recommended Travelers and Georgia Interlocal Risk Management Agency (GIRMA) as providing the best two offers for coverage. All-inclusive yearly premiums (General Liability and Workers Comp. Insurance) were offered by these two carriers and they are as follows: (The third option below represents utilizing the lowest offer from each carrier for each area of coverage.)

GIRMA
 \$861,066.00 (\$585,864.00 GL & \$275,202.00 WC)
 Travelers
 Travelers (GL) & GIRMA (WC)
 \$799,545.00 (\$479,643.00 GL & \$319,902.00 WC)
 \$754,845.40 (\$479,643.00 GL & \$275,202.40 WC)

Note: The third option which combines Travelers (GL) and GIRMA (WC), although producing the lowest total, has the following drawbacks:

- 1. The 5 Million dollar coverage umbrella in the Travelers policy would not extend over the workers compensation coverage provided by GIRMA.
- 2. By belonging to the GIRMA workers compensation insurance, we would be subject to joint and severable liability meaning we could be required to share any major assessments resulting from claims paid by the insurance pool members. Although this is not a common occurrence, it is a possibility and worth consideration.
- 3. If we go into the GIRMA workers compensation program, we will take a hit on our insurance mod rating due to being included in a pool format with GIRMA meaning our current mod rating of .79 would be relegated to at least a 1.0 when and if we shopped workers compensation insurance in the future (a rating below 1.0 is desirable as our current rating provides the City with a 21% discount). After being in a pool based workers compensation program for 12 months, the City's mod would be placed at a 1.0 by the National Council of Compensation Insurance (NCCI). This council assigns mod ratings for entities when they seek coverage in the open market.
- 4. Last year, our premium with Travelers was \$492,649 and this year's quoted premium is \$319,902 with a zero deductible. In addition to our premium trending downward, we have received excellent service regarding workers compensation claims management from Travelers.

Policy Issue: Council Approval

Recommendation: Motion to approve the Sole Source purchase of a replacement gearbox for the final clarifier at the WWTP from Smith & Lovelss Georgia Inc. in the amount of \$42,672.27.

Background: The Final Clarifiers are large round tanks where solids are settled from the waste water stream before exiting the plant. The tanks are constantly cleaned by a large rotating assembly in the center of the tank, which is powered by an electric motor that is attached to a large gearbox. Unfortunately the gearboxes on our unit is over twenty years old, has completely failed and must be replaced. Staff attempted to purchase replacement parts and repair the unit in house but because of age only complete gearboxes are available.

Budget Impact: CIP funds for Waste Water Treatment Plant repairs will be used.

WWTP Final Clarifier Repairs

The Smith & Loveless drive unit which turns the sludge collection arms on #6 Final Clarifier is in need of repair. WWTP Maintenance personnel have inspected the drive system and found that the worm gear reducer was worn beyond repair.

This unit experienced the same problem back in 2013. At that time, Aulbert was able to purchase the parts needed to repair the drive from Smith & Loveless at a cost of approximately \$16,000 and place the unit back into operation. He requested an updated quote from the manufacturer of the spare parts; however, Smith & Loveless replied that "they were unable to provide them like they had done in the past" because it would render the torque control device inaccurate (See attached email). They recommended that the City purchase the entire replacement unit at a cost of \$42,672.27. Aulbert also attempted to find replacement parts through another supplier (manufacturer) with no luck.

The original drive units for the final clarifiers were installed during construction back in 1992, meaning the entire drive gear operated for 20+ years with no failures until 2013 when the last repair was done on final clarifier #6. The replacement of the worn parts (worm gear reducer and slow speed shaft) in 2013 lasted for only 5 years because it is too difficult to place these gears/sprockets perfectly on the shaft to minimize premature wear. The purchase of the entire replacement unit will eliminate the errors which occur during the rebuilding of the drive because it is delivered from the manufacturer as one complete, calibrated unit ready for installation onto the collection drive framework.

It is our recommendation that we purchase the Large Gear Reducer (entire replacement unit) for the price of \$42,672.27 so the WWTP's final clarifier #6 can operate as designed, with confidence, for another 20+ years.



RE: Intergovernmental Agreement for Fire Services with Bulloch County (Fire District Contract)

Policy Issue: NA

Recommendation: Recommend entering into the Intergovernmental Agreement with Bulloch County for one (1) year (as stated within the agreement) with the understanding that efforts shall continue to work with Bulloch County toward a long term agreement.

Background: The Statesboro Fire Department has provided Fire Services for an established area of Bulloch County. This area is approximately five (5) miles from each of the two (2) Statesboro Fire Stations as is commonly referred to as the "Statesboro Fire District". The current agreement, signed in 2013, was for a five (5) year term and expires July 1, 2018. The agreement before council is for (1) year and is intended to allow the Statesboro Fire District Fire Committee time to develop an agreement that both the City of Statesboro and Bulloch County would be agreeable to entering into for an extended period of time.

Budget Impact: Entering in to this agreement will have no budget impact but will allow the City to continue to receive the revenues collected within the Fire District. (1.8 mills for properties with the Statesboro Fire District).

COUNTY OF BULLOCH

INTERGOVERNMENTAL AGREEMENT FOR FIRE PROTECTION SERVICES

This intergovernmental agreement is entered into this 1st day of July, 2018 by and between the MAYOR AND COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF STATESBORO, GEORGIA, a municipal corporation (hereinafter "the City") and BULLOCH COUNTY, a political subdivision of the State of Georgia, acting by and through its governing authority, the BULLOCH COUNTY BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS (hereinafter "the County").

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the City of Statesboro operates a paid fire department currently with two stations fully manned around the clock that provides fire suppression and prevention services to its citizens; and,

WHEREAS, given the amount of staffing, training, equipment and water supply, and communications available to the fire department, the Insurance Services Office (ISO) has determined that the Statesboro Fire Department currently qualifies for a Class 3 Fire Insurance Rating, on a scale of 1 (best) to 10 (uninsured); and,

WHEREAS, the ISO recognizes the same fire insurance rating for areas outside the limits as inside, if those areas are within a five-mile travel distance of one of the City's fire stations, there is available water to the site, and there is an agreement in place to assure response; and,

WHEREAS, the availability of a quick response by a fire department staffed around the clock as supplemented by a County fire department, currently consisting of volunteer/reservists, offers a reduction in homeowners and business property insurance premiums that more than offsets the additional taxes that would be collected by establishing a fire district for those properties outside the City, but within the five-mile travel distance of a City fire station; and,

WHEREAS, the City is willing to provide fire suppression services within such an area, and the County has determined that doing so will provide those citizens with a higher level of fire protection at a net reduced cost when insurance premiums and a fire tax district are compared; and,

WHEREAS, the City and County have such a fire district currently in place, and wish to continue it for the duration of this Agreement, or subsequent renewal, as the most cost effective and efficient means of providing fire protection to this area; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to a previous agreement the County withheld a certain portion of money previously collected from the aforesaid fire district to assist the County with the provision of

County fire services within the fire district, and the parties now desire to specify how such funds shall be expended in this Agreement;

NOW, THEREFORE, both parties, City and County, covenant and agree as follows:

-1-

The County has established a special fire tax district, hereinafter referred to as the "Statesboro Fire Tax District" or "SFT District," based upon the five mile driving distance from City fire stations required by the ISO for a property to receive the same ISO rating as provided in the City. The current boundaries of the SFT District are indicated by the area in blue on the map attached hereto as Exhibit A. The SFT District shall be designated upon a map prepared and maintained by the County's GIS Division. The boundaries shall be clearly defined, and the parcels affected coded appropriately so that the SFT District tax can be added to the County's property tax bill for each parcel. The County shall furnish to the City a reasonable number of such maps at no cost. The County agrees to maintain the current SFT District for the duration of this Agreement.

-2-

The money collected from the SFT District tax shall be paid to the City of Statesboro by the 20th day of each month for which tax receipts are collected prior to the beginning of that particular month to pay for the services rendered by the Statesboro Fire Department. The City hereby agrees to establish a Special Revenue Fund, entitled the "Statesboro Fire Services Fund", and shall account for financial activities accordingly. Any funding remaining at fiscal year-end shall remain in this fund as fund balance, to be used as necessary in future years.

-3-

The City and County recognize that property taxes are not billed until mid-October, and are not overdue until mid-December of each fiscal year. Consequently the funding to pay for this service will not be immediately available each year. It is agreed by the parties that the City, the County, or some combination thereof, may loan the Statesboro Fire Services Fund the necessary funds each year to cover this temporary cash flow shortage. In that event, each entity shall be entitled to interest on that temporary loan equal to what it would have earned each month on said funds had it been invested in the City's or County's overnight investment accounts. Said interest shall constitute a valid expense of the Statesboro Fire Services Fund. Any funds in the Statesboro Fire Services Fund shall earn monthly the same rate of interest as the City's other overnight investment accounts earn for said month.

-4-

Pursuant to a previous agreement the County withheld a certain portion of money previously collected from the SFT District to assist the County with the provision of fire services within the SFT District. The current balance of funds so withheld by the County is One Hundred Forty-six Thousand Eight-nine and 86/100 Dollars (\$146,089.86) (hereinafter referred to as "the County SFT District Fund Balance"). The parties hereby agree that the County shall pay the balance of

the funds in the County SFT District Fund Balance to the City for deposit into the Statesboro Fire Services Fund to be used by the City toward the purchase of a tanker truck or other resources in an effort to maintain an ISO flat PPC rating within the SFT District; provided, however, that use of the funds for the purchase of anything other than a tanker truck must be formally approved by the Bulloch County Board of Commissioners prior to the purchase.

-5-

The City and County may jointly amend the boundaries of the SFT District as well as the term of this agreement at any time by mutual consent, and shall work together on any proposed expansions of the SFT District in the event that the City considers the addition of a fire station(s). In the event the City constructs an additional fire station(s), the County may, but shall not be obligated to, expand the boundaries of the SFT District and/or lengthen the term of this agreement. The County shall not construct any fire delivery infrastructure in the SFT District or within the city limits of the City of Statesboro during the term of this Agreement.

-6-

There is hereby created the Statesboro Fire Tax District Review Committee (the "Committee") consisting of the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners, a Commissioner appointed by the Chairman, the County Public Safety Director, the County Fire Chief, the Mayor, a Councilman appointed by the Mayor, and the City Fire Chief to review and advise the governing bodies regarding fire services, including, but not necessarily limited to placement of any new fire stations, possible expansion of the SFTD, joint training and the advisability of a longer-term agreement. The Committee shall have its regular meeting the first Monday in October each year at 10:00 a.m. in the City Council Chambers at City Hall. Special meetings of the Committee shall occur as necessary upon the call of either the Chairman of the Board of Commissioners or the Mayor of the City of Statesboro. All meetings of the Committee shall comply with Section 50-14-1 *et seq.* of the Official Code of Georgia Annotated, commonly referred to as the "Open Meetings Act" or "Sunshine Law."

-7-

The parties agree that any fees or charges for services such as burning permits, fire code prevention, excessive false alarms, hazardous material spills, or other fire related services, shall be paid into the Statesboro Fire Services Fund to support the fire department's budget.

-8-

The County agrees to use all legal remedies available to a County Tax Commissioner to collect any and all delinquent tax accounts in the SFT District due to the Statesboro Fire Services Fund.

-9-

The Statesboro Fire Department shall provide the same level of suppression response for all calls within the SFT District as it does for identical calls within the City. The Statesboro Fire Department shall respond to all calls within the SFT District based on the accepted practice of

triage for fire incidents. The City shall also be designated by the County as the department responsible for the area within the SFT District.

-10-

The City shall investigate the causes of a fire incident within the SFT District in the same manner as it does for any identical fire incident within the City.

-11-

City and County agree to cooperate in order to formulate a plan designed to achieve a uniform ISO Fire Insurance Rating throughout the SFT District by addressing and evaluating existing water systems and sources, potential need for additional resources and alternative water delivery methods for fire suppression, and the adequacy of existing County ordinances relating to water system regulations and fire prevention and protection. The end goal of said plan shall be to ensure there are adequate and uniform fire suppression capabilities throughout the SFT District. The Committee shall meet no later than six (6) months from the date of entry of this Agreement in order to review progress on said plan. The adoption or approval of any County ordinances or amendments to County ordinances is within the sole province and discretion of the Bulloch County Board of Commissioners, and the County cannot and does not guarantee or warranty any particular level of water system performance.

-12-

The City's Fire Marshal shall be designated by the County as the party responsible for Fire Code and Life Safety Code interpretations and enforcement within the SFT District to assure uniformity of construction standards for fire prevention purposes.

-13-

The City's fire department shall be responsible for maintaining records of any testing of private water systems within the SFT District. The City's fire department shall provide copies of testing records to ISO when required.

-14-

The City shall provide to the County on a monthly basis a financial report for all activities and transactions for the Statesboro Fire Service Fund in the same manner as it does for the Mayor and City Council of Statesboro.

-15-

As payment for services under this Agreement, the County agrees to levy an ad valorem tax on all taxable property in the SFT District at a millage rate of 1.8 mills for each fiscal year during the term of this Agreement. The County shall pay the revenue generated from said tax to the City in accordance with the provisions of this Agreement, and this shall constitute the sole remuneration from the County to the City for fire suppression services in the SFT District for the duration of this Agreement.

The City shall provide the County with a proposed budget for the Statesboro Fire Services Fund not later than April 20th of each year, so that the County can review and provide input on it prior to City Council adoption.

-17-

The parties hereby agree that all assets currently used by the Statesboro Fire Department shall remain the property of the City of Statesboro, and any assets purchased in the future from the money in this fund, shall be and remain the sole property of the City of Statesboro. The parties further agree that this service contract is for the use of those assets during the term of this Agreement only.

-18-

Nothing herein shall alter in any manner any agreements for mutual aid response from the Statesboro Fire Department, or any fire department within Bulloch County.

-19-

Written notice required by this Agreement shall be sent to the City Manager on behalf of the City, and to the County Manager on behalf of the County.

-20-

- (a) If the Parties cannot cooperatively resolve any issue that may arise between the Parties concerning this Agreement in a timely manner, the Parties agree to attempt to resolve the dispute, claim or controversy arising out of or relating to this Agreement by non-binding mediation before a neutral third party agreed upon by the Parties. If the Parties cannot agree upon a neutral third party then each Party shall select a neutral third party and those two neutral third parties shall confer and select a third neutral third party to conduct the non-binding mediation. The Parties further agree that their respective good faith participation in mediation is a condition precedent to pursuing any other available legal or equitable remedy, including litigation, arbitration or other dispute resolution procedures.
- (b) Either Party may commence the mediation process by providing to the other Party written notice, setting forth the subject of the dispute, claim or controversy and the relief requested. Within ten (10) days after the receipt of the foregoing notice, the other Party shall deliver a written response to the initiating Party's notice. The initial mediation session shall be held within thirty (30) days after the initial notice. The Parties agree to share equally the costs and expenses of the mediation (which shall not include the expenses incurred by each Party for its own legal representation in connection with the mediation).
- (c) The Parties further acknowledge and agree that mediation proceedings are settlement negotiations, and that, to the extent allowed by applicable law, all offers, promises, conduct and statements, whether oral or written, made in the course of the mediation by any of the Parties or

their agents shall be confidential and inadmissible in any litigation, arbitration or other legal proceeding involving the Parties; provided, however, that evidence which is otherwise admissible or discoverable shall not be rendered inadmissible or non-discoverable as a result of its use in the mediation.

The provisions of this section may be enforced by any court of competent jurisdiction, and the Party seeking enforcement shall be entitled to an award of all costs, fees and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, to be paid by the Party against whom enforcement is ordered.

-21-

Should any part of this Agreement be declared invalid by a court having competent jurisdiction, then the other parts shall remain in full force and effect unless amended by mutual agreement of the parties.

-22-

This Agreement, as supplemented by the Bulloch County Service Delivery Agreement, constitutes the full agreement between the parties in regard to fire suppression services, and this Agreement may not be amended except by written approval by both parties.

-23-

This Agreement shall be construed and interpreted under the laws of the State of Georgia.

-24-

Both parties covenant and agree that this Agreement shall be effective from the date of this Agreement through June 30, 2019, and that no provision of this Agreement shall be effective or binding on either of the parties after June 30, 2019.

RE: Proposed RFQ for a Transit System Study

Policy Issue: Does the City Council want to consider having an RFQ process to acquire consultant proposals for a transit system study.

Recommendation: It is recommended that the Council approve staff advertising for a transit study services that are in line with the RFQ. The RFQ is attached for your review.

Background: As part of the TSPLOST there was \$500,000 budgeted for Transit System expenditures. In order to determine the need for the system, types of systems that would be able to efficiently serve Statesboro and cost to operate having a comprehensive study is recommended.

As you are aware, the City will not begin to receive TSPLOST funding until the first half of 2019. Therefore, to finance the study now funds will be used from the General Fund. Those funds will then be reimbursed as TSPLOST revenues come into the City.

Budget Impact: It is estimated the study may cost in the \$30,000 to \$60,000 range.

Request for Proposals TRANSIT FEASIBILITY STUDY for the City of Statesboro, Georgia

INTRODUCTION

Overview

The City of Statesboro is soliciting proposals from qualified consultants to develop a Transit Feasibility Study to determine the viability of a public transportation system. The study will evaluate needs, consider alternatives, and recommend implementation strategies. It is anticipated that the Transit Feasibility Study will also assist with applicable transit funding possibilities and requirements.

ANTICIPATED SCOPE OF WORK

The City of Statesboro is interested in receiving proposals from a consultant possessing experience with Transit Feasibility Studies and a proven record of accomplishment in transit planning and implementation.

The Transit Feasibility Study work elements include:

- A. **Purpose and Need Statement**: The purpose and need statement will form the basis for developing goals, objectives, and the evaluation criteria used for the study. The consultant is expected to interact with the City, GDOT, the private transportation providers, and others as required to complete the process.
- B. **Public Participation**: The City desires to involve stakeholders throughout the community. Currently, there is no fixed route public transit service inside the City of Statesboro. The engagement of residents, institutions and others is a critical element of the Transit Feasibility Study and will require effective outreach and communication skills. City requires a consultant with a proven track record of community engagement in regards to a discussion of transit alternatives and concerns. The consultant should possess the skills to analyze transit issues and alternatives, and communicate with area residents on feasibility, funding possibilities, and financial constraints. The City will assist the consultant with the development of an effective Public Participation plan. This shall include project information provided by the consultant to be placed on the websites of the City and the member agencies to update the projects status and opportunities for public involvement. Public participation opportunities include, but are not limited to, the following:
 - **Steering Committee**: The consultant will develop a Steering Committee meeting schedule and the City will assist with meeting space and communications coordination.
 - **Stakeholder Interviews**: In order to involve as many participants as possible, the City requests that interviews be held with an approved list of stakeholders. The consultant will be responsible for scheduling and coordinating the interviews.

- **Focus Groups**: Public support of an expanded transit system is crucial to the success of the study. The consultant should hold focus groups with area decision makers and business leaders to inform, educate, and receive feedback on the study.
- Public Open Houses: The consultant will coordinate with the City and hold a series of public open houses to gather input on transit needs, to inform the public on the study process, and to receive on proposed transit alternatives and community impacts related to the Transit Feasibility Study.
- **Surveys**: The consultant will be responsible for surveys used to obtain current information on transit needs.
- C. **Development of Alternatives**: The consultant will develop a broad range of potential alternatives that address the purpose and need, provide details on the methods used to review and rank the alternatives, and conduct initial and final alternatives recommendations.
- D. **Develop Transit Criteria**: The consultant will evaluate alternatives based on criteria that will determine whether an alternative is reasonable to pursue. The analysis should involve impacts on the transportation system, mobility, and travel patterns, and consider barriers to implementation of the alternatives, and cost.
- E. **Evaluate Costs, Benefits, and Impacts**: The consultant will evaluate all reasonable alternatives to provide for public transit system. The evaluation of the costs, benefits, and impacts should focus on the pros and cons between alternatives. As a part of the study, the consultant will be required to identify any possible impacts that the transit program may have on minority and low-income populations. Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 prohibits discrimination on the basis of race, color, or national origin in programs and activities which receive Federal funding assistance.
- F. **Develop Ridership Forecasts**: The consultant will develop ridership forecasts based on the results of the community surveys and available data regarding land use, economic development, and population and employment growth.
- G. **Develop Organizational and Operational Plans**: The consultant shall develop organizational and operational plans for the alternatives that include standards of service, facility and stop locations, days and hours of operation, type and number of vehicles, travel times, fare structure, peak load capacity, and vehicle/passenger miles and hours traveled.
- H. **Develop a Comprehensive Transit System**: The consultant will review the existing transit services provide by other organizations and agencies in the community and determine the level of additional transit services required to serve the population of the City. Identification of transit enhancements can be developed in phases. The proposed transit system must determine the feasibility of the program and identify possibilities to serve residents not serviced in the initial phases.
- I. **Develop Operating Financial Plan**: The consultant will develop operating financial plans for the top 3 alternatives which includes factors that impact financial projections. The financial plan shall include

City ownership, contract, partnership, Capital and Operations and Maintenance costs for a 5 year period.

Project Details

The Transit Feasibility Study is being undertaken to determine the viability of public transportation throughout the City of Statesboro. The results will determine how to proceed with public transit in the future as the study will show public need and benefit, probable users, analysis of alternatives, and a recommendation on the best alternative that fulfills the public transit needs of the City of Statesboro. It is critical that the study identifies the transit features, characteristics, and options that meet the local goals and objectives, financing alternatives and partnerships, and mitigating any possible adverse impacts from the recommended strategies.

The primary objectives of the study are:

- Convene a stakeholder group
- Identify baseline conditions including data collection and analysis
- Determine unmet transportation needs and options for transit services
- Develop strategies to meet needs, including service, cost, and alternatives
- Evaluate alternatives to provide recommendations and an action plan to implement

INSTRUCTIONS TO PROPOSERS

Solicitation

The City will negotiate a professional services agreement with the successful respondent. All respondents are responsible for the costs incurred in responding to this proposal. The basic agreement template is attached.

Submission of Proposals

It is intended that each respondent furnish all information requested in this document. Unless specifically requested, promotional literature is not desired and will not be considered to meet any of the requirements.

The response shall be organized into the following items to address how the respondent will complete items identified within the Scope of Work:

- 1. <u>Transmittal Letter</u> shall not exceed two pages in length and shall bear the signature, in ink, of an authorized representative of the respondent and designate by name the individual authorized to negotiate and sign an agreement with the City on behalf of the respondent.
- 2. <u>Organization</u> include a description of your organization, including qualifications for the project and your organization's capability to provide the services requested. Also include a description of your understanding of the City's needs in the proposed project and your staffing commitments to assure your ability to meet the City's time frame. Please describe past client projects you have completed that are similar in nature to that proposed in this document.

- 3. <u>Project Procedures</u> include a description of how you will produce each of the items requested in this RFP. This must include the methods used and the quality control/ quality assurance procedures that will be observed. Non-Discrimination Statement: The City of Statesboro, in conjunction with the State of Georgia, requires that all contractors, vendors, and suppliers doing business with any State agency, department, institution or recipient of pass-through grants, provide a statement of non-discrimination. By signing and submitting their proposal, the offeror certifies they do not discriminate in their employment practices with regard to race, color, creed, religion, age, sex, ancestry, national origin or disability.
- 10. <u>Cone of Silence</u>: Lobbying of Procurement Evaluation Committee members, City Government employees, and elected officials regarding this product or service solicitation, or Request for Proposals (RFP) or contact by any member of a proposer's staff, or those people employed by any legal entity affiliated with an organization that is responding to the solicitation is strictly prohibited. Negative campaigning through the mass media about the current service delivery is strictly prohibited. Such action may cause your proposal to be rejected. - 11. <u>Modification Or Withdrawal Of Proposals</u>: Proposals may be modified or withdrawn by the offeror prior to the established due date and time. No oral, telephonic, telegraphic or facsimile responses or modifications to informal, formal bids, or Request for Proposals will be considered.
- 12. <u>Proprietary Information</u>: The proposal of the successful offeror(s) becomes public information. Proprietary information can be protected under limited circumstances such as client lists and non-public financial statements. Pricing and service elements are not considered proprietary. An entire proposal may not be marked as proprietary. Offerors must clearly identify in the Executive Summary and mark in the body of the proposal any specific proprietary information they are requesting to be protected. The Executive Summary must contain specific justification explaining why the information is to be protected. Proposals may be reviewed and evaluated by any person at the discretion of the State. However, the City may award a contract based on the initial proposals received without discussion with the respondent. If oral presentations are required, they will be scheduled after the submission of proposals. Oral presentations will be made at the respondent's expense.

This process is a **Request for Proposal/Competitive Negotiation** (RFP) process. Each Proposal shall be evaluated, and each respondent shall be available for negotiation meetings at the City's request. The City reserves the right to negotiate on any and/or all components of every proposal submitted. From the time the proposals are submitted until the formal award of a contract, each proposal is considered a working document and as such, will be kept confidential. Clarification and/or revisions to the specifications and requirements
