





Page 5 of 11 Development Services Report Case RZ 23-03-04 The subject site is a vacant 2.65 acre lot. There has been no development on the site. This property is at the end of Myrtle Crossing Drive and fronts Highway 80 East. Originally the plan for the area consisted of a transitional zoning from the Highway into the neighborhood with commercial and office on the Highway, and a lower density neighborhood on the other side. This area was originally proposed to be a professional office park and the parking are laid out for this purpose. One office complex has already been located there.

The *City of Statesboro 2019 – 2029 Comprehensive Master Plan* designates the subject site in the a local gateway, but also "Established Residential Neighborhood" area, with the established residential area being characterized by traditional neighborhoods that were developed from the late 19th to mid-20th century, featuring connected grid streets and neighborhood scale commercial development.

ENVIRONMENTAL SITE ANALYSIS

The subject property does not contain wetlands and is not located in a flood plain.

COMMUNITY FACILITIES AND TRANSPORTATION

The subject property can access both city water and sewer.

ZONING MAP AMENDMENT STANDARDS FOR DETERMINATION

The mayor and city council in exercising its zoning power, shall be governed by the following standards in making its determination and balancing the promotions of the public health, safety, morality [morals] and general welfare against the right of unrestricted use of property:

- 1. Existing uses and zoning or [of] property nearby.
 - The proposed use is of a much higher residential density than the surrounding uses, and are of a different nature in comparison to the original development. It is staff's opinion that the current zoning is appropriate.
- 2. The extent to which property values are diminished by the particular zoning restrictions.
 - Although an appraisal has not been conducted on the property, it is Staff's opinion that the proposal will likely decrease the value of the surrounding properties.
- 3. The extent to which the description of property values of the property owner promotes the health, safety, morals or general welfare of the public.
 - The surrounding properties are one of few purpose built subdivisions in the City and have not had any drastic changes in surrounding use since construction.
- 4. The relative gain to the public, as compared to the hardship imposed upon the property owner.
 - The site has been vacant since development of the adjacent neighborhood, and office complex.
- 5. The suitability of the subject property for the zoned purposes.



- Initial evaluation of the property does cause concern regarding the adjacent neighborhood. At this time it has not been determined what possible restrictions may be associated with the subdivision.
- 6. The length of time the property has been vacant as zoned, considered in the context of land development in the area in the vicinity of the property.
 - The property has historically been vacant.
- 7. The extent the proposed change would impact the following:
 - Population density in the area.
 - Population density would increase with the number of proposed units.
 - Community facilities.
 - The development would increase the use on utilities.
 - Living conditions in the area.
 - The living conditions in the area are not likely to change immediately.
 - Traffic patterns and congestion.
 - There would be an increase in traffic in the area.
 - Environmental aspects.
 - Greenspace would need to be included as commercial and higher density residential development are bound by all requirements in the tree ordinance.
 - Existing and future land use patterns.
 - As the site is adjacent to the highway the zoning transitions into the neighborhood with only one nearby area containing higher density residential development.
 - Property values in the adjacent areas.
 - The development of this project will create new tax revenue for the City, but may not increase general property values in the area.

8. Consistency with other governmental land use, transportation, and development plans for the community.

• The proposed residential development does not appear to be consistent with the 2019-2029 Statesboro Comprehensive Master Plan. The "Established Residential" character area calls for Neighborhood scale retail and commercial development, and single-family residential development. The "Gateway Area" is generally meant to guide specific types of development regarding architectural compatibility and vehicular traffic.





WHEREAS, O.C.G.A. § 21-2-265(a) further provides that the Govering Authority shall not change any polling place until notice of the proposed change shall have been published for once a week for two consecutive weeks in the legal organ for the county in which the polling place is located; and

WHEREAS, O.C.G.A. § 21-2-265(f) provides that a polling place shall not be changed on a day in which a primary, election, or runoff is held, or during the 60 day period prior to any general primary or general election or runoff from such primary or election, nor shall a polling place be changed in the 30 day period prior to any special primary or special election or runoff from such special primary or special election, except, in the discretion of the superintendent, when an emergency or event occurs during such time period which renders the polling place unavailable; and

WHEREAS, the current polling place for the Statesboro One voting precinct is the William James Educational Complex, 150 Williams Road, Statesboro, Georgia 30458; and

WHEREAS, the City of Statesboro finds that the Luetta Moore Building is more suitable for a permanent polling place location than the William James Educational Complex in that the Luetta Moore Building will provide more space to adequately accommodate poll workers, election equipment, and voters, and the Statesboro Mayor and Council therefore desires to permanently relocate the polling place for the Statesboro One voting precinct to the Luetta Moore Building; and

WHEREAS, the Luetta Moore Building is located within the current boundaries of the Statesboro One voting precinct; and

WHEREAS, the notice of the proposed change attached hereto as Exhibit "A" has been published in the <u>Statesboro Herald</u>, which is the legal organ for Bulloch County, on Thursday, March 30, 2023 and again on Thursday, April 6, 2023; and

WHEREAS, there is no primary, election, or runoff scheduled within 60 days of April 18, 2023, nor is there any special primary or special election or runoff from such special primary or special election scheduled within 30 days of April 18, 2023, which is the date of this resolution;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Statesboro Mayor and Council as follows:

<u>Section 1.</u> The City of Statesboro Mayor and Council, on its own motion, hereby permanently changes the location of the polling place for the Statesboro One voting precinct to the following location:

Luetta Moore Building 585 Martin Luther King Jr. Drive Statesboro, Georgia 30458

<u>Section 2</u>. In accordance with O.C.G.A. § 21-2-265(a), the City of Statesboro Mayor and Council hereby authorizes and orders that, during the seven days before and on the day of the first election following such change, notice of the change in the polling place for the Statesboro One voting precinct shall be posted on the previous polling place and at three other places in the immediate vicinity thereof, with each notice posted stating the location to which the polling place has been moved and directing electors to the new location, and at least one notice at the previous polling place shall be a minimum of four feet by four feet in size.

<u>Section 3</u>. All resolutions, actions, or parts thereof previously approved and adopted by the City of Statesboro Mayor and Council that are in conflict with the provisions contained in this resolution are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded and repealed.



Background: The Fire Department utilizes Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) to breath in hazardous situations that require supplemental air as opposed to ambient. The emergencies include any call that has a smoke-filled environment or is oxygen deficient. The Fire Department has budgeted for the replacement of outdated and non-compliant Self-Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) that have reached their end of use life. Through the State of Georgia contract, the purchase of 3 SCBAs, 18 cylinders and 10 face pieces will utilize Fischer Scientific, which required no outside bid. The total purchase amount for this equipment is \$44,768.42

Budget Impact: This purchase will utilize funds from the 2019 SPLOST.

Policy Issue: Purchasing

Recommendation:

Staff recommends award of the West Main Street Intersection contract to Atlas Technical Consultants, LLC (Atlas) in the amount of Not-To-Exceed (NTE) \$399,800.00. The Agreement attached to this memo provides a breakdown of services to be provided. The bid received from Atlas meets the requirements of the bid package and an acceptable bid bond was submitted.

Background:

This project proposes to assess the intersections of West Main Street with Martin Luther King Jr. Drive and Johnson Street and provide a solution for realignment of roads entering these intersections. All three roadways at this intersection are major routes for city traffic and intersect at a skewed angle which also causes sight distance issues and long vehicle queues on Johnson St. and MLK. Further, there are drainage considerations with Little Lotts Creek and an adjacent railroad spur. This project will realign the intersections to improve intersection safety and efficiency, provide drainage infrastructure improvements, and include easements and parcel(s) acquisitions needed to complete the work.

The City of Statesboro issued Requests for Proposals (RFP) for engineering services for the subject project. These request for proposals responses were evaluated and ranked on each qualification based on the criteria of cost, experience of staff, experience of firm and project approach. The contract will consist of two phases: Phase 1 will consist of survey data collection, traffic studies, Right-of-Way (ROW) acquisition, cost estimating, and concept plan development. Phase 2 will consist of final design and permitting, cost estimating, and construction document preparation for implementation of the project. Additionally, the consultant will provide property acquisition services for impacted parcels.

Budget Impact: This project is to be paid from TSPLOST funds.

THIS AGREEMENT (Agreement") is made and entered into this <u>18</u> day of <u>April</u>, 2023 by and between the **CITY OF STATESBORO**, **GEORGIA** hereinafter referred to as the "City", party of the first part, and **Atlas Technical Consultants**, **Inc.**, hereinafter referred to as "Contractor", party of the second part,

- 3. Contractor shall not perform any work that is clearly beyond the "Scope of Services" unless and until such work has been authorized in writing by the City of Statesboro. Contractor's compensation for work that is clearly beyond the "Scope of Services" shall be at a negotiated rate and in this instance, payment shall be made upon certified billing and progress reports to be made monthly to the City by Contractor for work performed during the preceding month, with payment to be made by the City within thirty (30) days from receipt of such billing.
- 4. If any items in any invoices submitted by the Contractor are disputed by the City in good faith for any reason, including the lack of reasonable supporting documentation, City shall temporarily delete the item(s) and shall promptly notify Contractor of the dispute and request clarification and/or remedial action. After the dispute has been settled, Contractor shall include the disputed item on a subsequent regularly scheduled invoice or on a special invoice for the disputed item only. The undisputed portion of the invoices shall, however, be paid within the normal 30-day period.
- 5. The Contractor assumes full responsibility for the payment of all assessments, payroll taxes, or contributions, whether State or Federal, as to all Contractor's employees engaged in the performance of work under this contract. In addition, the Contractor agrees to pay any and all gross receipts, compensation, transaction, sales, use, or other taxes and assessments of whatever nature and kind levied or assessed as a consequence of the work performed or on the compensation paid under this contract; provided, however, that, in no event shall Contractor be responsible for payment of any taxes relating to the City's income.
- 6. Alterations, deletions, and/or additions to the terms and conditions of this contract may only be made by the mutual written consent of the parties.
- Any term or condition of the Contract which by operation or existence is in conflict with applicable Local, State, or Federal Law shall be rendered void and inoperative. City and the Contractor agree to accept the remaining terms and conditions.
- 8. Should any part of this Agreement be declared unenforceable, all remaining sections shall remain in effect.
- This Agreement is made under, and in all respects shall be interpreted, construed, and governed by and in accordance with, the laws of the State of Georgia. Venue for any legal action resulting from this Agreement shall lie in Bulloch County, Georgia.
- 10. Contractor hereby covenants and agrees that they will not discriminate, with reference to work to be performed pursuant hereto, against any employee or

applicants because of age, race, color, religion, sex, disability, sexual orientation, genetic information or national origin.

- 11. All data, materials, documents, notes, memoranda, intellectual property, and other information provided or disclosed by Contractor to City, or otherwise used by Contractor to provide or perform any Scope of Services, in connection with this Agreement shall be owned solely and exclusively by Contractor and shall constitute the confidential and proprietary information of Contractor for all purposes hereunder (all the foregoing, collectively, "Contractor's Confidential Information"). The City shall neither copy, nor disclose nor distribute to any third party, any of Contractor's' Confidential Information without Contractor's prior written consent unless required to do so by the Georgia Open Records Act (O.C.G.A. § 50-18-70 et. seq.), other similar laws, in response to a court order, subpoena, or other legal process. Prior to any such disclosure the City shall notify the Contractor. Further, the City shall not use any such Contractor's Confidential Information, except to the extent permitted hereunder. The City's obligations under this Section 11 shall survive any termination or expiration of this Agreement, and promptly after any such termination or expiration, or upon any request by Contractor, the City shall return to Contractor all such Contractor's' Confidential Information and all copies thereof unless the City is required by law to retain the documents. In no event shall the City acquire any ownership or other rights in any Contractor's Confidential Information, whether by implication or otherwise, except to the extent expressly set forth herein. Subject to the foregoing in this Section 11, Contractor shall make available to the City all data, notes and memoranda completed during the Scope of Services and upon completion of the services will forward to the City the results of the Scope of Services for its use.
- 12. This Agreement may be terminated by either party at any time and for any reason upon <u>Thirty (30)</u> days' prior written notice. Upon termination Contractor shall be entitled to payment only for the actual cost of the work completed in conformity with this Agreement and any other costs actually incurred as are permitted by this Agreement.
- 13. All claims, disputes and other matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement or the breach hereof shall be governed by the laws of the State of Georgia.
- 14. Contractor agrees, on behalf of City, to comply with the requirements of the Fair Credit Reporting Act. Contractor agrees to give notice to and obtain written authorization from every applicant prior to conducting any background investigation on said applicant.
- 15. This Agreement is intended by the parties hereto to be the final expression of their Agreement, and it constitutes the full and entire understanding between the parties with respect to the subject hereof, notwithstanding any representations, statements, or agreements to the contrary heretofore made.



JM TURK ROAD AT MARTIN ROAD ROUNDABOUT - DESIGN

Hall County Department of Transportation In late 2018, Hall County requested that Atlas prepare a roundabout design to alleviate traffic congestion located along Martin Road and JM Turk Road, which was located near Martin Elementary School. The project had to be completed over the summer of 2019 before school started again. Atlas designed the roundabout with a 100-foot diameter interior island including a stamped apron with 20foot travel lanes and three approaches. A 5-foot sidewalk



was provided along the west side of Martin Road and JM Turk for future tie-in. The new design for no-stop conditions could handle approximately 3,500 vehicles per day between 15 and 20 mph. Additional right of way was purchased over a period of nine months with the roundabout construction being completed and opened to traffic in the fall of 2019 and ready for school.

GWINNETT COUNTY SPLOST PROGRAM – PROGRAM MANAGEMENT, ROW SERVICES, AND QUALITY ASSURANCE

Gwinnett County Department of Transportation – Various Transportation Improvement Projects

Gwinnett County has funded transportation improvements through a continuous succession of SPLOST programs that started in 1985. The current six-year SPLOST was approved in 2017 and 65% of its projected revenue, in conjunction with GDOT and federal aid, will provide an estimated \$486M to improve every aspect of the county's transportation network. Gwinnett County's SPLOST program has funded all phases of a list of projects ranging from complex interstate interchanges to neighborhood sidewalks.

Atlas has provided program management, construction management, concept development, cost estimating, constructability reviews, land acquisition, and environmental services for the past 30 years to the Gwinnett County Department of Transportation. The value of the projects completed during the course of five consecutive contracts is more than \$1.5 billion.

1 | EXPERIENCE WITH SIMILAR PROJECTS

Atlas acquired required right of way and easements for Newton County on seven parcels within the limits of Newton County's project for construction of a traffic roundabout and improvements at the intersection of Kirkland Road and Jack Neely Road. Atlas provided pre-acquisition activities that included managing title searches and appraisals. Atlas conducted negotiations with property owners and worked with the County to close on the properties. During Newton County DOT's preconstruction activities related to the construction of a Roundabout and improvements at the intersection of Kirkland Road and Jack Neely Road, it was determined that land acquisition related to the roadway could be expedited by using a fast-track method of valuing the required acquisitions. This would allow for expedited communication with and offers to property owners impacted by the project. It would also provide coordinated valuations and could be done in parallel with plan development. This project is currently under construction.

BASS ROAD SCOPING STUDY AND CONCEPT REPORT

Bibb County

This project involved widening and reconstruction of CR 742/Bass Road in Macon, from Zebulon Road to Northside Drive. Within the project limits is the I-75 interchange with Bass Road. The total project length is approximately 4.8 miles. Atlas was responsible for preparing the scoping study with detailed traffic analysis that included both existing and future conditions, identified operational improvements at intersections and along the corridor, and prepared logical termini analysis to determine the phasing of the project. Atlas also



prepared the concept layouts, typical sections, cost estimates for ROW, utilities, and construction. This project is now moving into the preliminary and final plan stages.

EFFINGHAM PARKWAY, EFFINGHAM COUNTY – DESIGN, ROW AND CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERING AND INSPECTION

Effingham County Board of Commissioners/GDOT

Effingham Parkway is a new-location corridor, through sensitive environmental resources, intended to facilitate regional travel through central Effingham County. This project will relieve a high volume of traffic on SR 21. The proposed project would consist of constructing a two-lane new location roadway from SR 30 to Blue Jay Road. The project will begin at SR 30 approximately 1.5 miles west of SR 21 and be located across from Chatham County's proposed Benton Boulevard Extension project. The end of the project would terminate at Blue Jay Road, approximately 3.2 miles west of SR 21. The intersection of Effingham Parkway at Blue Jay Road would be realigned to have Effingham Parkway tie into the east side of Blue Jay Road and the west side of Blue Jay Road would form a T-intersection with Effingham Parkway. The typical section is proposed to have 12-foot lanes with 10-foot outside shoulders (including 6.5-foot paved) on an 80-foot right-of-way. Right-turn and left-turn lanes would be provided at the intersections of SR 30, Goshen Road, Walter Tuten Road and Blue Jay Road. The total length of the project is approximately 6.4 miles.

Atlas performed all the preconstruction services including the geotechnical investigation for a total of 8 miles of new construction connecting SR 30 and Blue Jay Road. Atlas completed planning studies, traffic analysis, concept development, environmental studies, preliminary plans, final plans, ROW acquisition, CEI, and cost estimating. This project is currently under construction with Atlas providing CEI Services.

HINESVILLE AREA METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATION: EG MILES PARKWAY CORRIDOR STUDY – PLANNING STUDY AND PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT

Hinesville Area Metropolitan Planning Organization

Atlas serves as a prime consultant to assess the SR 119/E.G. Miles Parkway corridor in Hinesville, Georgia, which runs between General Screven Way and SR 119/Airport Road. The main entrance to the Liberty Regional Medical Center, commercial shopping centers, residential communities, the City of Hinesville Public Works Department, and the headquarters of Liberty Transit are all located along this corridor. The corridor is also about a mile from the main access gate to the Fort Stewart Military Installation. With multiple at-grade intersections, one railroad crossing, business driveways, and cross sections ranging from 4-lanes with a center two-way left turn lane to 4-lanes undivided without any existing center median, the route handles 17,000 to 21,700 vehicles per day (vpd).

The study focuses on capacity and safety improvements that are based on findings in a previous Road Safety Audit (RSA) performed by GDOT a few years prior. The scope included data collection, review of existing plans, traffic modeling, incorporation of GDOT RSA recommendations, schematic plans, signal warrants screening, Intersection Control Evaluation (ICE) analysis, cost estimation, and detailed reporting. A multi-lane roundabout was included at one location as an additional analysis.

Atlas held stakeholder meetings, public meetings, focus group meetings, as well as presenting to elected officials, technical committees, GDOT District staff, and policy committee for adoption. The study was completed in the Fall of 2022.



Visible and buried utilities in the area include overhead power and telephone lines and buried sewer, gas, water, fiber, and phone lines. Based on the results of the Traffic Study Report, we will work with the City on a final recommendation. Public Involvement

Two out of the three alternatives shown to the left involve roundabouts. Regardless of whether the final design includes roundabouts or the traditional intersection(s), pedestrian, lighting, and landscape concerns must be taken into consideration.

A proper roundabout or intersection design is critical and must consider vehicles and pedestrians equally for a well-balanced solution that provides ample capacity, reduced delay, and increased safety for everyone. Unfortunately, pedestrian considerations are sometimes given a lower priority and are often treated as more of an afterthought rather than an integral component of the design. We want to ensure that pedestrian movements are considered and incorporated in this design.

Roundabouts introduce geometry and channelization that a driver may not expect unless it is always visible. In addition, the effectiveness of auto headlights is limited in a roundabout due to the constrained curve radius, making the roadway lighting system very important for nighttime visibility of pedestrians, obstructions, and hazards; care should be taken to minimize glare and light trespass or pollution. Atlas was fortunate in that we recently purchased TransMart. TransMart is recognized as an expert in proper roadway lighting, and they will be used to help guide our decision-making process in relation to any lighting needs.

Landscaping is one of the distinguishing features that give roundabouts an aesthetic advantage over traditional intersections. Landscaping in the central island and along the approaches can benefit both public safety and community enhancement. In addition to landscaping, some local governments use the central island of a roundabout as an opportunity to display local art or other gateway features. To

determine the type and quantity of landscaping or other material to incorporate into a roundabout design, maintenance, sight distance and the available planting zones should all be considered. The primary objectives and considerations of incorporating landscaping or art into a roundabout design are to make the central island more conspicuous, thus improving safety.

Policy Issue: Purchasing

Recommendation: Consideration of a Motion to Award a Contract to Y-Delta Inc. in the amount of \$225,667.17 for the installation of approximately 1400' of 8" water main to serve new construction on Briarwood and the Wastewater Treatment Plant Office. Project to be paid with system revenue funds approved in the FY2022 (carryover) CIP WWD-32a.

Background: In order to provide adequate fire protection to new residential construction, an existing residence, existing offices, and the Wastewater Treatment Plant Office on Briarwood Road, we are recommending the installation of 1400lf of new 8" water main. This area is currently served by a small 2inch "main" that does not provide adequate flow for fire protection in this area.

The project was properly advertised and bid; however, only one bid was received from Y-Delta Inc in the amount of \$225,667.17. Prior approved was provided by the city manager/assistant city manager to open one bid. The bid is above our original budget estimate of \$150,000.00 but this is driven mostly by increased material and labor costs.

Staff has reviewed the bid and determined the price is justified given the current economic conditions and time constraints with this project as new construction is underway in this area.
