An Ordinance Amending Article 2 (Authorities, Boards and Commissions) of Chapter 2 (Administration) of the Statesboro Code of Ordinances

WHEREAS, the City has previously adopted ordinances creating certain Authorities, Boards and Commissions; and

WHEREAS, the Mayor and City Council has determined there is sufficient reason and need to amend certain sections of Article 2 (Authorities, Boards and Commissions) of Chapter 2 (Administration) of the Code of Ordinances, City of Statesboro, Georgia to create the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Statesboro, Georgia, in regular session assembled as follows:

SECTION 1:

Article 2 (Authorities, Boards and Commissions) of Chapter 2 (Administration) of the Code of Ordinances, City of Statesboro, Georgia is hereby amended to read as follows:

Sec. 2-55 Establishment; appointment; terms; compensation; removal.

Sec. 2-56 Chairman; rules of procedure and bylaws; meetings.

Sec. 2-57. Scope of Authority.

secs. 2-58-59 Reserved.

Sec. 2-55. - Establishment; appointment; terms; compensation; removal.

There is hereby created a board to be known as the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion. The Commission on Diversity and Inclusion shall consist of eight (8) members who shall be residents of Bulloch County. The term of office of each appointed member shall be two years, and the term shall begin on October 1st, and end at the stroke of midnight on September 30th. The initial term for initial members of the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion shall end on September 30, 2020. The initial members of the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion have been appointed at the time this chapter takes effect and shall hold office for the balance of their terms then remaining, and their successors shall be appointed by the Mayor and City Council for a term of two years. Vacancies on the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion occurring other than by expiration of term shall be filled by an interim appointment for the unexpired term by the Mayor and City Council. The Mayor and City Council shall have the authority to remove any member of the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion by a majority vote for cause, on written charges, after a public hearing. The Mayor and City Council in consultation with the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion may appoint non-voting ex officio members to said Commission to provide Administrative Support and/or subject matter expertise. All members shall serve without compensation.

Sec. 2-56. - Chair; rules of procedure and bylaws; meetings; records.

a. The Commission on Diversity and Inclusion shall elect a chair from among its members who shall serve for a term of one year and who shall be eligible for re-election as chairman.

b. The Commission on Diversity and Inclusion shall make its own bylaws and rules of procedure and shall determine its time and place of meetings.

c. The transactions of the Commission on Diversity and Inclusion are governed by the Georgia Open Meetings Act O.C.G.A. §§ 50-14-1 et. seq., and it shall be the joint and several responsibility of the members to comply with the Georgia Open Meetings Act.

Sec. 2-57. — Scope of Authority.

The Commission on Diversity and Inclusion shall have the authority to prepare studies and reports, strategies, education efforts and programs for the purpose of informing the governing body on policy matters related to promoting diversity, inclusion, and equity among the citizens of Statesboro connected to issues of poverty and prosperity.

SECTION 2: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 3: This ordinance shall become effective immediately upon its adoption by the City Council.

The Department of Planning & Development has reviewed the alcoholic beverage application submitted by Karen O'Nealfor 721 S Main Street, Suite 8 (Tax Parcel # MS5200008 000)). The applicant is proposing the sale of retail liquor by the drink at this location. The proposed sale of alcohol is permitted at the location and the application **may be approved based on council determination**. Staff's recommendation is based on the following:

1) Zoning District: 721 S Main St East is located in the PUD/CR (Planned Unit Development/Commercial Retail) zoning district. Sale of beverages is permitted in this district.

2) General Regulations Pertaining to all Licenses: Per Chapter 6 Section 6-7(c)(2) of the *Statesboro Code of Ordinances*, Class D alcoholic beverage licenses may be issued in the PUD/CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district.

3) Alcoholic Beverages Proximity Restrictions: The Department of Planning & Development has reviewed the subject property for consistency with the proximity restrictions of Chapter 6 Section 6-7(d) of the *Statesboro Code of Ordinances*. The proposed location is required to adhere to the regulations set forth by O.C.G.A. § 3-3-21. As per Chapter 6(d)1, Class D, E, and F licenses shall be issued for a location only if the location complies with the proximity requirements provided by O.C.G.A. § 3-3-21 as measured by the rules and regulations promulgated by the Georgia Department of Revenue. As of the date of this document, the attached survey shows encroachment of 60 feet of the Georgia Southern University property line. Conformity with proximity regulations may be waivered with council approval.

Department of Planning and Development approval is based on the information provided within the alcoholic beverage application submitted for our review.

ANALYSIS

I. Variance from Article X Section 1003 C: *Front yard*. There shall be a front yard on each street on which a lot abuts which shall not be less than 25 feet in depth.

The applicant is requesting a variance from <u>Article X Section 1003 C</u> to reduce the **minimum front yard setback from 25 feet to 18.65 feet**. This variance is specifically being requested in order to allow for the reconstruction of a larger Chick-fil-A restaurant at the same location. A portion of the Drive-Thru Canopy will be located in the area where the normal 25 foot building setback would be regulated in the CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district.

II. Variance from Article X Section 1003 H: *Rear yard setbacks.* There shall be a rear yard setback of 25 feet.

The applicant is requesting a variance from <u>Article X Section 1003 H</u> to reduce the **rear yard setback from 25 feet to 23.8 feet.** This variance is specifically being requested in order to allow for the reconstruction of a larger Chick-fil-A restaurant at the same location. A portion of the Drive-Thru Canopy will be located in the area where the normal 25 foot building setback would be regulated in the CR (Commercial Retail) zoning district.

ANALYSIS (Cont'd)

The *Statesboro Zoning Ordinance* provides for the award of variances by the City Council from the zoning regulations, stating that "approval of a variance must be in the public interest, the spirit of the ordinance must be observed, public safety and welfare secured, and substantial justice done. A variance may not be granted for the use of land that is not permitted by zoning regulations."

Section 1801 states that the Mayor and Council [should] consider if the following are true in its consideration of a variance request:

- 1. There are special conditions pertaining to the land or structure in question because of its size, shape, topography, or other physical characteristic and that condition is not common to other land or buildings in the general vicinity or in the same zoning district;
- 2. The special conditions and circumstances do not result from the actions of the applicant;

The applicant did not take action to result in this zoning classification.

- 3. The application of the ordinance to this particular piece of property would create an unnecessary hardship; and
- 4. Relief, if granted, would not cause substantial detriment to the public good or impair the purposes and intent of the zoning regulations.

In the course of exercising any of the above powers, the zoning board of appeals may attach conditions to its approval.

RECOMMENDATION:









EXHIBIT F: DOUBLE LANE ORDER CANOPY ELEVATIONS (Continued)





Chapter 6-7

(n) Hours of operation. The following hours of operation shall apply to the sale of alcoholic beverages licensed hereunder:

(1) All licensed premises for the sale of retail beer and/or wine by the drink or retail liquor by the drink (Class D, E and F licenses) shall only engage in the sale and service of alcoholic beverages upon the licensed premises, at a permitted outdoor event, or a permitted catered event between the hours of 7:00 am and 1:00 am the following day Monday through Saturday. Sale and service of alcoholic beverages pursuant to this subsection that begins on Saturday may continue until 1:00 a.m. Sunday morning without a Sunday sales permit.

(2) Only licensed premises for the sale of retail beer and/or wine by the drink or retail liquor by the drink (Class D, E and F licenses) which maintains a valid Sunday sales permit may begin the sale and service of alcoholic beverages on Sunday. All licensed premises for the sale of retail beer and/or wine by the drink or retail liquor by the drink (Class D, E and F licenses) which begins the sale and service of alcoholic beverages on Sundays shall only engage in the sale and service of alcoholic beverages upon the licensed premises, at a permitted outdoor event, or a permitted catered event between the hours of 12:30 p.m. 11:00 a.m. and midnight on Sunday.

(3) All licensed premises for the package sales of beer and wine for off-premises consumption (Class B and C licenses) shall only engage in the sale of alcoholic beverages between the hours of 6:00 a.m. and midnight current time, Monday through Saturday.

(4) Only licensed premises for the package sales of beer and wine for off-premises consumption (Class B and C licenses) which maintain a valid Sunday sales permit may sell alcoholic beverages on Sunday from 12:30 p.m. through 11:30 p.m.

Any defendant charged hereunder with possession of one ounce or less of marijuana shall be entitled on request to have the case against the defendant transferred to the court having general misdemeanor jurisdiction in Bulloch County.

ORDINANCE 2018-14

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CHAPTER 58, OFFENSES AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS, OF THE CODE OF THE CITY OF STATESBORO, GEORGIA TO PROVIDE PENALTIES FOR POSSESSION OF MARIJUANA; TO REPEAL ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HEREWITH; AND FOR OTHER PURPOSES

WHEREAS, the City of Statesboro has an interest in maintaining the public safety and general welfare of the citizens of the City of Statesboro and its visitors; and

WHEREAS, the City is committed to creating a safer Statesboro by reducing crime, working to ensure the safety of its citizens and fostering a relationship of trust and partnership within the community; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 36-32-6(a) and (c), Statesboro Municipal Court is vested with jurisdiction to try and dispose of cases where a person is charged with possession of one ounce or less of marijuana when the offense occurs within the corporate limits of the City of Statesboro; and

WHEREAS, any fines and bond forfeitures arising from the prosecution of such cases shall be retained by the City pursuant to O.C.G.A. § 36-32-6(b); and

WHEREAS, currently there is no ordinance setting punishment for possession of less than one ounce of marijuana within the corporate limits of the City as authorized by the state; and

WHEREAS, enactment of an ordinance concerning the offense of simple marijuana possession within City limits is intended to enhance public safety and eliminate costs by reducing the amount of time police officers spend in connection with the arrest, processing and transportation of those accused of simple marijuana possession; and

WHEREAS, enactment of an ordinance concerning the offense of simple marijuana possession is further intended to prevent young people from entering the criminal justice system and avoiding the enduring stigma associated therewith; and

WHEREAS, it is not the intent of the City Council to legalize or otherwise decriminalize the possession of marijuana within the corporate limits of the City; and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of Mayor and City Council to specifically provide that a person convicted of a violation of Section 58-12 shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500.00, or community service should the Court find financial circumstances so-dictate, and shall not be punished by a term of any imprisonment.

<u>BE IT ORDAINED</u> by the Mayor and Council of the City of Statesboro, Georgia, in regular meeting of Council assembled, and pursuant to lawful authority thereof:

<u>SECTION</u> <u>1</u>: That Chapter 58, Offenses and Miscellaneous Provisions, , of the Code of the City of Statesboro, Georgia be amended by inserting Section 58-12 entitled "Marijuana" as follows:

Sec. 58-12– Marijuana. It shall be unlawful for any person to possess one ounce or less of marijuana within the corporate limits of the City of Statesboro. Any person found guilty of violating this section shall be punished by a fine not to exceed \$500.00. Where the Court finds that a defendant is without the financial means to pay a fine, the Court may direct the defendant to perform community service commensurate with the fine that would otherwise be imposed. In no event shall any person convicted of marijuana possession pursuant to this section be punished by imprisonment for any term. Any defendant charged hereunder with possession of one ounce or less of marijuana shall be entitled on request to have the case against the defendant transferred to the court having general misdemeanor jurisdiction in Bulloch County.

<u>SECTION 2</u>: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

<u>SECTION 3</u>: This ordinance shall be effective January 1, 2019.

Ordinance 2018-15

Sec. 2-2.4. – Presentation of Code of Ordinances Revisions to Mayor and Council

a) Proposed revisions to the Code of Ordinances shall be brought up as an agenda item at a regularly scheduled meeting of Mayor and Council or during "other business" of a regularly scheduled meeting. The person(s) requesting the revision shall present explanation and reason for making the proposed revision to Mayor and Council. Suggestions for revisions to the Code of Ordinances shall only be made by the Mayor, Council or City staff. Any citizen, board or outside organization wishing to make a suggestion for revision shall contact their District Council representative or the Mayor, who may sponsor the idea before Mayor and Council.

b) An affirmative vote of a majority of quorum of Mayor and Council shall move the ordinance revision forward with a directive that the City Attorney draft proposed revision language. Vote to do so shall be taken in accordance with existing standard voting guidelines as outlined in the Charter.

c) The City Attorney shall then prepare a draft of the revision. In the case of a proposed revision to an existing ordinance, the City Attorney shall prepare a document that shows the existing ordinance in its current form with proposed additions and deletions notated in a comprehensible manner on a single copy. If intent to proceed with revision under (b) has been properly made, the City Attorney may present a so declared preliminary revision at a regularly scheduled meeting of Mayor and Council in order to facilitate discussion and seek input from Mayor and Council during the revision drafting process. A preliminary revision shall not be considered for passage by Mayor and Council. Public hearing on a proposed revision may only be allowed upon motion of Mayor and Council though it is not required for a preliminary revision to move forward.

d) Once the City Attorney has substantially prepared the proposed ordinance revision it should be presented as a First Reading and Public Hearing, which shall be run according to standard Charter meeting guidelines. Mayor and Council may vote in the affirmative to move the ordinance, as then presented or with only minor modification, forward to Second Reading. Substantial changes made to revision presented at First Reading shall require modified revision to be presented as a First Reading at a subsequent meeting of Mayor and Council.

e) Second Reading: Mayor and Council may move to approve or deny the revision as presented in the publicly available meeting agenda. Scrivener's errors may be corrected, but no substantive modifications to proposed revision shall be considered for passage.

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

Because the sewer is part of the Master Plan for sewer to serve multiple properties we are proposing that the City extend the sewer trunk line approximately 1500' across the next property (Windward South) to allow for continued development in the area. This property will also produce a substantial return on investment to the City generating roughly \$63,000.00 in water sewer revenues per year at full buildout.

As part of the Master Plan design Hussy, Gay, Bell Engineering has completed most of the design and permitting required, we will need them to finish that process and take the project to bid. The City will advertise and solicit bids using our standard sealed bid process and return the results to City Council for final approval. As part of the agreement to extend the sewer main the property owner has agreed to clear the R/W, install erosion control and provide all needed easements to the City.





- Owner will include the sanitary sewer work area in the erosion control plan for the proposed residential development.

RE: Policy Issue: Contract Award—Safety Equipment/Police Patrol Vehicles

Recommendation:

We recommend the contract to equip the new Police patrol vehicles with required safety equipment be awarded to West Chatham Warning Devices in the amount of \$179,590.22. This equipment includes lights, sirens and numerous other standard required equipment for police patrol vehicles.

Background:

Recently, the City of Statesboro awarded a purchase contract for Police Department patrol SUVs and a pickup truck to Wade Ford. These vehicles were funded under CIP# PD-1 with the remaining funds from the recent 1 mill increase with a budget not to exceed \$545,000.00 (vehicles and equipment). The total cost to purchase these eleven (11) vehicles was \$316,516.00 leaving a remainder of \$228,434.00 for equipping these vehicles with lights, sirens and other safety equipment. West Chatham Warning Devices (Savannah, GA) has provided superior products and service in the past for these items in our patrol vehicles. In order to obtain volume pricing for this equipment, we located a contract that West Chatham Warning Devices had been awarded through a competitive process with the City of Myrtle Beach, SC that meets the competitive policy requirements of the City of Statesboro's Procurement Policy. After contacting the City of Myrtle Beach, SC, to verify this contract, we obtained an agreement from West Chatham to extend this contract to the City of Statesboro. This contract contains the same pricing that was given to Myrtle Beach in their contract. If this contract is awarded by Council, we expect to get the new patrol vehicles equipped and in use within a couple of weeks.

RE: Policy Issue: Contract Award—Health Network and Pharmacy Services

Recommendation:

We recommend the contract for providing a health network and pharmacy services be awarded to Shaw Hankins who has proposed using Blue Cross Blue Shield (Anthem) with Pharm Avail as the pharmacy provider. Shaw Hankins has met or exceeded all requirements listed in our RFP and has offered the lowest priced plan to the City of Statesboro (See attachments). In addition, their proposed service model offers a highlevel of management potential with increased future savings. This recommendation comes with unanimous approval from the evaluation committee consisting of Darren Prather (Central Services Director), Cindy West (Finance Director), Jason Boyles (Public Works and Engineering Director), Steve Hotchkiss (Utilities Director) and Flavia Starling (Human Resources Director). If this contract is awarded, a 30 day notice of cancellation of services will need to be delivered to our current broker and a new brokerage contract will need to be signed with Shaw Hankins as broker of record. Due to the historical knowledge of the City of Statesboro's health insurance history, staff recommends a one year contract for health advisory services in the amount of \$12,000.00.

Background:

The City of Statesboro recently issued a request for proposals (RFP) to provide the City with a health provider network and pharmacy services. This opportunity was advertised per the City of Statesboro's policy and directly sent to all of the national major health provider markets as well as all known interested local networks.

All proposals were evaluated by the evaluation committee based on cost, services provided and references/ratings. During this process, the proposals were received, copies given to our current broker (Glenn Davis and Associates) and members of the evaluation committee. After time was given to review the submittals, presentations to

the evaluation committee were scheduled for the submitting health network providers. These presentations provided an overview of the provider's proposal followed by a question and answer section from the committee.

After further evaluation by the committee, it was determined to request the health network providers submit a best and final cost (See attachments provided) and to provide an additional presentation to the City Council and evaluation committee. It was felt this additional step was necessary to further clarify the services provided and financial proposal for each health network be proposed.

During these final presentations, a heavy emphasis was placed on final cost to the City and the method to which the costs were derived. Each provider supplied a cost grid listing the projected yearly cost for their proposed plan (See attachments) These cost totals included medical, pharmacy, stop-loss and administrative fees.

The attachments included in this recommendation contain spread sheets that list costs "as submitted" by the provider and the corrected costs due to mathematical errors by the providers in their submittals.

In addition, the attachments contain comparisons based on two projected yearly medical claims costs (\$5,237,835.00 and \$6,680.103.00) We felt it was necessary to apply the discount percentages provided by each network to accurately compare all three proposals based on the two differing medical cost amounts provided (See attachments for a detailed explanation of cost structures).

In the process of forming a recommendation, the evaluation committee focused mainly on cost and services provided per the RFP requirements. After this in-depth process, the evaluation committee came to a unanimous consensus ranking placing Shaw Hankins (brokering Blue Cross Blue Shield/Anthem) as the highest ranking, Blue Cross Blue Shield/Anthem as the second ranked provider and TBR/IBG as the third ranked submitted proposal. Again, these rankings were focused on cost and services provided. Shaw Hankins provided the lowest cost (See attachments) in all scenarios and it was felt the best customer service potential. Some services provided by Shaw Hankins included software to assist HR in the day to day management of our health program complete with an employee portal to allow access to assist in the personal management of their needs. Shaw Hankins also carved out the pharmacy portion from Blue Cross and offered Pharm Avail (a pharmacy program) which resulted in approximately \$300,000 projected savings for our yearly pharmacy program (See attachment). Since this proposal contains Blue Cross Blue Shield coverage the network is nationwide. Shaw Hankins also provided a \$300,000.00. guaranteed savings or would provide \$50,000.00 to the City if this goal was not met.

Blue Cross Blue Shield (Anthem) Direct finished second in our ranking due to cost and services provided. Blue Cross Blue Shield Direct provided the second lowest plan cost

(See attachment) and it a nation-wide network as well as standard services expected. They also offered a \$20,000.00 yearly grant to be allocated to our health and wellness program.

TBR/IBG finished third in our rankings based on cost (See attachments) and services provided. In addition to cost being the highest, the committee was concerned about limited network potential specifically in medical cases involving services out of the Statesboro area.

It is important to again to state for clarification purposes, the City currently uses Glenn Davis and Associates as a broker for these services at a cost of approximately \$12,000.00 per year. This yearly fee is paid to them and is not a part of our current plan nor would it be a part of any of the listed plans involved in this RFP process.
